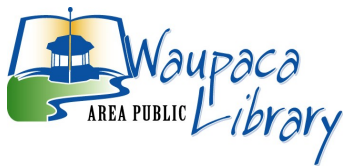

January 12th – Crafting Free-for-All

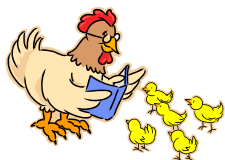

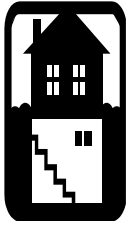

Basement Reviews by Dawn Under

I'm sure Kevin Henkes was writing from his experience of being not only a Wisconsinite, but a father of a young girl, when he wrote **Junonia**. Ten year old, Alice, and her family are vacationing in Florida, as they have every year. However, this year everything is about to change, and Alice has to learn how to accept and grow with the changes. Alice begins to shed her self-centered troubles and starts to see her world through other people's eyes and needs. **Junonia** is a very gentle and family centered story.

For those who enjoy talking mice and adventure, there are two tales that might satisfy. **Young Fredle**, by Cynthia Voight, and **Bless This Mouse**, by Lois Lowry, each could please any fan of Kate DiCamillo's **The Tale of Despereaux**. In **Young Fredle**, a young adventurous mouse gets kicked out of his "safe" home and learns to survive in the wild. Fredle meets some really nasty raccoons, discovers other mice families, and eventually returns home where he tries to change the false ideas his family and friends have about the outside world and other mice societies. Hildegard, the heroine of **Bless This Mouse**, is the leader of the mice of Saint Bartholemew's Church, and it is, therefore, her duty to not only move her disorderly community of mice out of the church before the arrival of the GREAT X, but to keep her fellow mice safe during the annual Blessing of the Animals. Being the leader that she is, Hildegard has her critics, Lucretia among them, and her admirer, Roderick.

Emerald Atlas, by John Stephens has been described as a young person's **Lord of the Rings**. Of course this will be decided as the following books in this series are published, but, so far, I think I agree. An atlas has maps, charts and tables that give people the directions they need to travel from one spot to another. Emma, Kate and Michael, three children who have bounced from one horrid orphanage to another, have finally reached the most wretched looking children's home. While she constantly believes that her parents will someday return, Kate discovers a strange green atlas that slams the three siblings through time and space where they must trust and depend on one another, some dwarves, a wizard and some noble strangers to destroy an evil witch, save a town full of innocent people and possibly discover how their future and 3 magical atlases are unavoidably tied together. This story has great character development, humorous moments, high suspense and, what young readers seem to want, the promise of future books in this story.
