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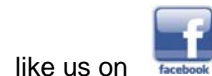

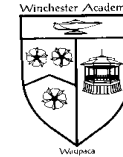

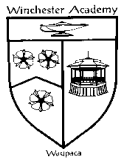

the Modern Middle East**

**Tim Crain**, Ph.D. is Professor and Director of the National Catholic Center for Holocaust Education at Seton Hill University. The US has experienced enormous challenges in the Middle East over the past fifty years. Autocracies and the rise of religious extremism have contributed to the problems facing US foreign policy. The objective was to stabilize the region, but American efforts seemed to have little impact, and in some cases, made a bad situation even worse. We will review the past, present, and future of US foreign policy in the Middle East.

**Julie Fisher Mead** is the Associate Dean for Education and a professor in the Department of Educational Leadership and Policy Analysis at UW-Madison. Her research centers on legal issues related to special education and legal issues raised by various forms of school choice, including charter schools and vouchers.

**Randy Cornelius** is the Oneida Language and Cultural Archivist. Indigenous cultures have traditional teachings of how the world originated. The Iroquois are an oral society, and have passed down through millennia their understanding of how the world began. These teachings will give an Aboriginal view of the world and explain the responsibilities the Creator intended the human family to uphold as the protectors of the natural world.
